

The First Day

Genesis 1:1-5

Did you ever look at a job you have to do, like perhaps a huge mess in your garage, and not even know where to begin?

Can I just say for the record that I never want to move again? At least never out of state again. My family and I could not be more grateful to God for calling us out and leading us here to you, Hempfield. What an awesome opportunity He has blessed us all with as we begin a new life together full of hope and promise of what He is going to do through us. It is wonderful to be here.

But let me tell you, there were more than a few times for my family and I that we felt like everything was complete chaos as we prepared for the move here. Details in selling our house, preparing our house so it was ready to sell, preparing Oakland Church for our departure, preparing ourselves to leave friends and family, transferring utilities, car information, finding a place to live in PA, setting up the movers, cleaning, showing the house to potential buyers, cleaning, movers packing everything up for a weekend, cleaning, packing up our cars, driving here (with a small dog who does not do well in the car), movers unloading all our stuff, and finally standing in the midst of a house that is new to us full of boxes not knowing quite where to begin or where to even go for milk.

I probably have made my point. The physical and emotional drain is immense.

But underneath, above, behind, and before there is God in it all. Because in it all we knew the joy of what God was doing—creating new life for us, a new day for all of us. It just took trusting Him that He would put all the pieces back together. And that He did, and did beautifully.

Genesis 1:2 says it: *“The earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep.”* Sounds familiar, doesn’t it? There are some days when everything seems to be out of control that all you can do is long for some kind of order.

New life, a new beginning, often begins with chaos. Before there was life, before God’s creative power took over, there was just a formless void, waste, emptiness, darkness.

How much does the world right now feel as if it is in chaos? Wars and rumors of wars, shootings, increasing denial of God, hunger, disease.

Certainly what happens in the world affects us personally. There are times when we get overwhelmed with what is going on in our lives. The darkness which is still a part of the world seems to get a little too intimate with us. But listen. Do you hear it? Do you feel it? *“A wind from God swept over the face of the waters.”* The Spirit of God moved. *“And God said, ‘Let there be light’; and there was light.”*

Amidst the chaos God does speak.

He is here with us, waiting for us to be still and listen. God speaks to us over and over again the words we need to hear: “I love you.” How? He is right now. A word, an idea, overwhelming peace, the touch of someone who loves you, the light that begins to pierce the darkness. In God’s Word there is power.

He gave us His Son. God came to us, to stand with us, die for us, so that in death He could once again bring new life. That’s the new life we all have in Jesus Christ, no matter how far gone we may feel. And He gave us not only Jesus Christ but also His Body, the church. God’s voice and touch say, “I love you.”

Light in the darkness that nothing can overcome.

The formlessness and chaos is transformed into a new day. *“And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. God called the light Day, and the darkness He called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.”*

God’s creative power is still at work in the world. When I see you, Hempfield, love each other as you do, when you do the hard, dirty work of service to someone you barely know, faithfully and constantly pray, celebrate our older generation and lift up the younger, bless those whom we love that are ill, worship our Lord with open joy and praise—yes, I am then reminded again that God is alive and well and in control.

God’s creative power is still at work in the world, perhaps in unexpected ways, but He is still at work. I am living proof. You are living proof—a new beginning for you in your life, and a new beginning for us at Hempfield.

Seventy-Five Cents' Worth

Danny Thomas was earning five dollars a week in 1943 as a singer and comedian. Unable to care for his pregnant wife, he prayed to God, "Show me my way in life and I will build you a shrine." Shortly afterward, his act caught on and he had a regular gig for five years. His nightclub act got him roles in film and television, but he never forgot his promise to God.

A devout Catholic, he spoke to a cardinal and asked what sort of shrine would be appropriate. The cardinal said, "This world has plenty of statues but not enough hospitals for children who are sick."

And so St. Jude's Children's Hospital was born.

In 1959 Thomas was touring the country raising funds and a little boy at the Peoria State Hospital began shouting, "Danny Thomas! If you are here, if you're really here, I've got to see you!" The boy was blind from birth, wheelchair-bound and trembling with palsy. Thomas came over to him and the boy pressed an envelope into his hand.

"Take this," the boy said. There's seventy-five cents in here. I saved my candy money. I want you to use this to build that hospital for the kids." Weeping, Thomas thanked him and took the money.

Thomas never spent Billy Johnson's seventy-five cents. He showed people the money and it encouraged them to contribute millions of dollars and the hospital opened its doors in 1962. At that time, only 4 percent of children with acute lymphocytic leukemia survived. By 1991, the survival rate was 73 percent. Pat Williams writes, "Today, a statue of St. Jude stands in front of the hospital and Billy Johnson's seventy-five-cent donation is sealed inside the cornerstone beneath the statue—a fitting shrine to an entertainer and a little boy who were both committed to helping others."

We often hesitate to reach out to others because we think, "What can one person do in the face of such a big problem?" But there are plenty of things you *can* do today to make a real difference. Listen to someone who needs a sympathetic ear. Mow a neighbor's yard. Pack your lunch instead of buying it and give the money you saved to charity. Pray for an enemy.

Little Billy Johnson could never have imagined that God would use his seventy-five cents to raise millions of dollars and save thousands of children's lives. He just gave because he *needed* to. We are far too myopic to see what greatness might come from a simple act of service today. In Ecclesiastes 8:7 we read: *Since no one knows the future, who can tell someone else what is to come?*

You just never know how God will use what you do today. But He can't use you if you don't try.

Keeping Your Spiritual Zeal

Romans 12: 11-13

Verse 11: Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your Spiritual fervor, serving the Lord.

Verse 12: Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer.

Verse 13: Share with God's people who are in need. Practice hospitality.

WOW, does that first word in verse 11 actually say and mean "NEVER?" I must confess I have lacked zeal in serving the Lord more times than I care to admit.

So, how can we, moment by moment, day by day, keep our spiritual fervor in serving the Lord, be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, sharing with God's people who are in need and practice hospitality?

Well, I truly believe the secret lies in the last 3 words of verse 12 – being "faithful in prayer" and additionally, being faithful in reading and studying God's word. Because it is when we are in prayer and in His Word, the door opens for the Lord to infuse us with His Holy Spirit and the fruit of that Spirit is found in Galatians 5:22 which is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

It is when we are in the presence of the Holy Spirit that revelation comes to us. Revelation first and foremost of who He is, which alone is cause for joy and hope! Many things can be revealed to us during this time of seeking Him in prayer, such as individuals who need our prayers, encouragement, or assistance in a tangible way. It is when we are in His presence that we become more like Him and discover His purpose for our lives. If we ourselves are afflicted in any way, the Holy Spirit brings us compassion and peace.

There is one catch though....we MUST make the time to be in prayer and in His word and yes it IS sacrificial, but the benefits and joy of being in the presence of the God of the Universe far outweigh any small sacrifice we make.

May God richly bless you as you seek Him to sustain your spiritual zeal!
