

Think Big Pastor Pete Kontra

“Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us be thankful, and so worship God acceptably with reverence and awe, for our “God is a consuming fire.” --Hebrews 12:28

The Bible talks a lot about giving thanks.

- † 1 Thessalonians 5:18: *“Give thanks in all circumstances.”*
- † Philippians 4:6: *“Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God.”*
- † Psalm 100:4: *“Give thanks to Him and praise His name.”*
- † In Luke 17:11-19, we read of Jesus healing ten lepers. Verse 15 says, *“Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. He prostrated himself at Jesus’ feet and thanked Him.”*

How do I give thanks to God? Really. Am I short-sighted, or do I think BIG? **When you give thanks, think BIG.**

As we live our lives, our first stage of thanksgiving is:

Blissful: centered on the bliss of the moment, not really thinking too much about where God is in all of it. This is kind of the entry-level thanksgiving. It’s more centered on the bliss of the moment, not really understanding the deeper things going on, nor really thinking too much about where God is in all of it. That’s where many people exist in life. They are thankful, but kind of thankful in general—to no one or nothing in particular. As I heard someone say once, that’s like being married in general. It doesn’t really make sense.

And then, some move into the next stage of thanksgiving, a little deeper and little more awareness, but still pretty much:

I-centered: Centered on self-gratification.

This stage of thanksgiving goes something like:

“Thank You God for all I have. And as I look around me, God, at all those people who have very little, thank You that I am not like them.”

I-centered—just looking at your own feet.

You could say that the nine lepers Jesus’ healed that did not return to give thanks fall into this category. They were happy they were healed, and knew who it was that healed them. They went to Jesus after all. But off they went once they got what they wanted.

Now, this stage isn’t all bad. You begin to at least recognize from whom our blessings flow. It certainly is good to be thankful for what you have. But it kind of stops there. There’s not much outward activity going on to others. And, when the stuff we have goes, so goes our gratitude.

In this stage, our thanksgiving is pretty much based on our circumstances.

And so, where is it God calls us to be?

God-centered: the deep awareness that God has done something amazing here.

The Kingdom of God. Jesus came to us and declared that the kingdom of God has come. He is here, in all His resurrected glory and transforming power.

Power to heal our wounds. To shine His light into our darkness. To forgive us and set us free from living for just ourselves. To make us His children, as part of God’s family, that all know love and are part of something that will never be taken away. Living in His kingdom is living now in peace, in abundance of His grace and the fruit of His Spirit.

What can be shaken is all created things. All the things of this world—the earthly tables we set for ourselves—can and will be shaken. They will come to an end. They will pass away.

But God's kingdom cannot be shaken. Put your life into He who is unshakeable. May that be true for us as His Church.

Because when we do, it brings our focus off of ourselves and onto the hurting world around us, seeing once and for all that we are all in this together and all the same.

The author Fleming Rutledge writes:

“The life of thankfulness—Biblically speaking—is lived in view of the hard things of existence. As the life of thanksgiving deepens, we discover that the more mature prayers of thanksgiving are not those offered for the obvious blessings, but those spoken in gratitude for obstacles overcome, for insights gained, for lessons learned, for increased humility, for help received in time of need, for strength to persevere, for opportunities to serve others.”

Because you see, as I got a little deeper into life and away from merely thanking God that I was not like “those others” who didn't have what I had, God helped me to see that I am just like all of “them”. Yes, I am thankful that I have enough to eat and a house and many comforts. But all of that can be gone tomorrow.

And no matter what I have compared to my neighbor, we are all the same—fragile people who need love, hope, peace, and the knowledge that there is a kingdom that will never be shaken. So now my thanksgiving still shows signs of self-centeredness. But God has helped me to grow into a gratitude that knows it is only by His grace I am here. And because of that grace given to me, my thanks becomes a giving of all I am to Him. God bless you! -Pastor Pete

This morning the calendar on my phone announced that I needed to submit this article today. So I made a visit to someone, worked on some other things, had lunch, worked on some different other things and then proceeded to work on still different other things.

Why?

Because I feel quite uninspired today, that's why. And I've learned in ministry that attempts to communicate Divine truth generally work out better when one of God's truths has been recently revealed to me. Otherwise it turns out like one of several Charles Dickens pieces that make it obvious he was getting paid by the word. Diluted, lukewarm, aimless.

So today I am reminded of the goldfish Dori from “Finding Nemo” who tells everyone to “keep on swimming.” Eventually something will connect... but in this case by then it'll be too late.

You see, this whole thing is totally my fault, not God's. He seeks to impart truth and wisdom all the time. Is today a trial that will prove instructive? Maybe. Is this a lesson in humility? Perhaps. Is today a reminder that I need to sleep more, pray more effectively and stay closer to the cross? Probably.

My personal Heroes of the Faith never had days like this, did they? Well, of course they did. But I don't extend that grace to myself and consequently my self-perceived failure to measure up just makes it worse. We all have days like this, even when you're doing work that you love and are surrounded by caring and affirming people. Some call it “being human.”

So I'm going to keep doing “stuff” today until the current changes or until I start swimming with it, not against it. And my advice for you is that sometimes it's best to just keep swimming. And to remember this from Isaiah 41:10:

*“So do not fear, for I am with you;
Do not be dismayed, for I am your God.
I will strengthen you and help you;
I will uphold you with my righteous right hand.”*
